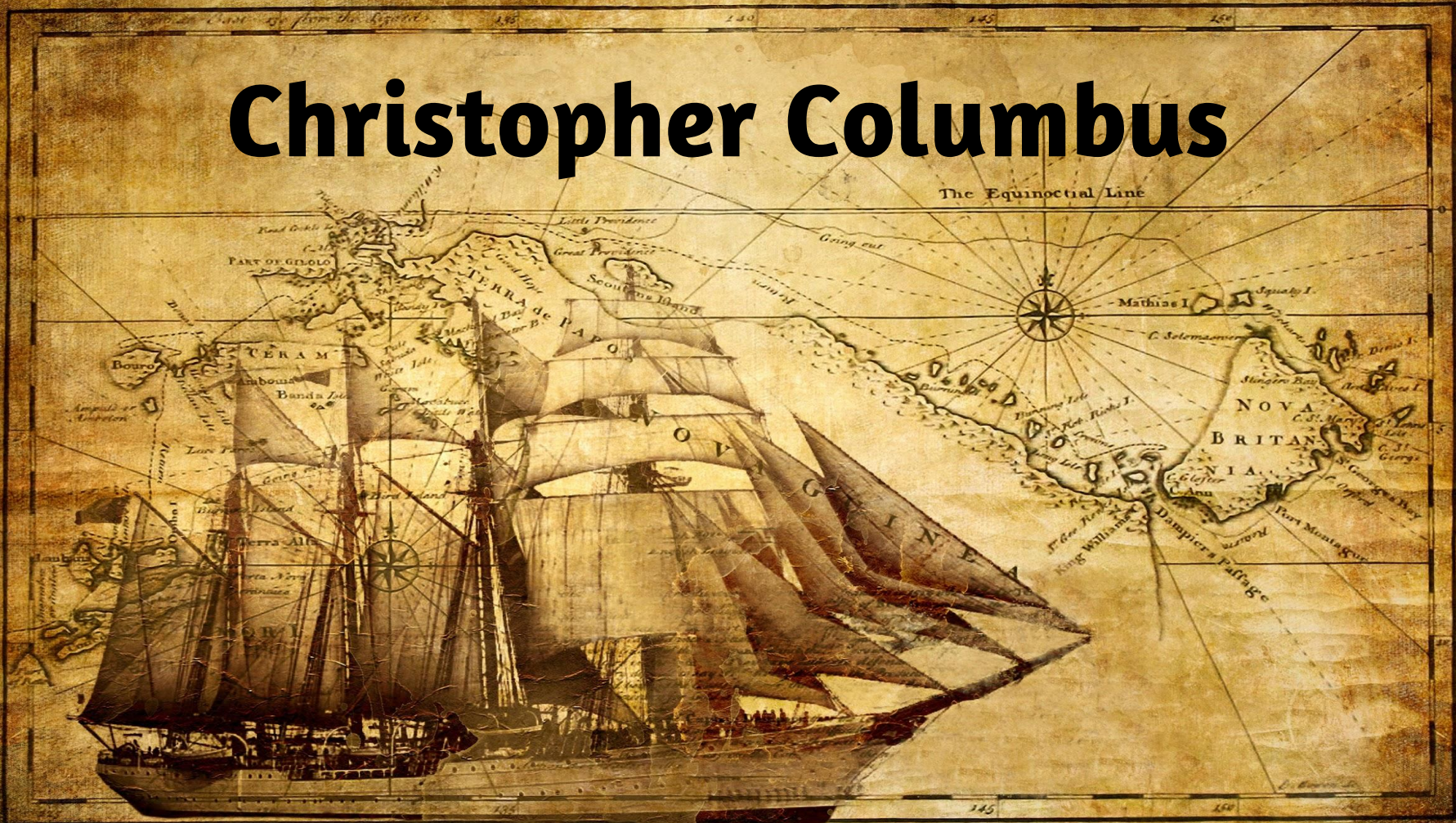

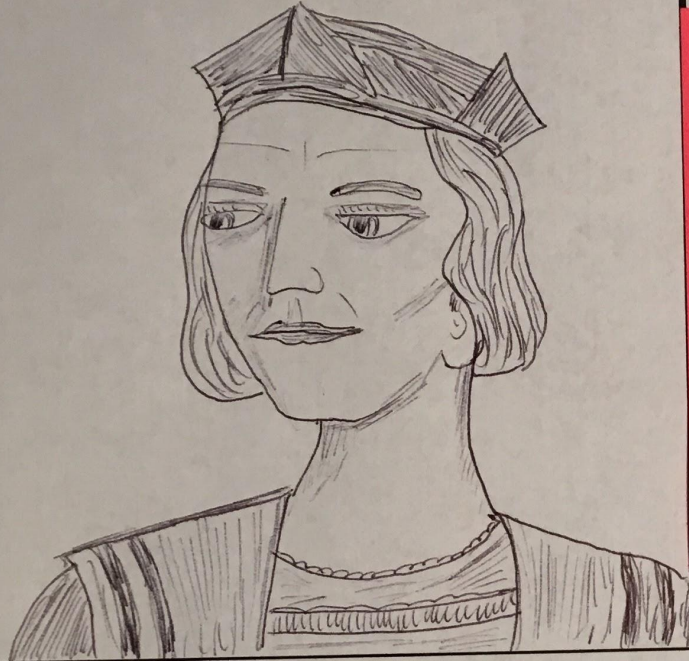

What did this explorer hope to find?

He hoped to find a water route to Asia to get spices, ivory, gems, gun powder, and silk.
He sought fame and fortune.

Did this explorer affect the lives of others? yes

If so, who and how? He introduced new lands and goods - especially foods like turkeys, potatoes, pumpkins, corn, pineapple, and vanilla - but also rubber, cotton, and tobacco to the Europeans upon his return. He had a negative impact on the natives due to stealing, harming/killing, kidnapping, and bringing diseases.

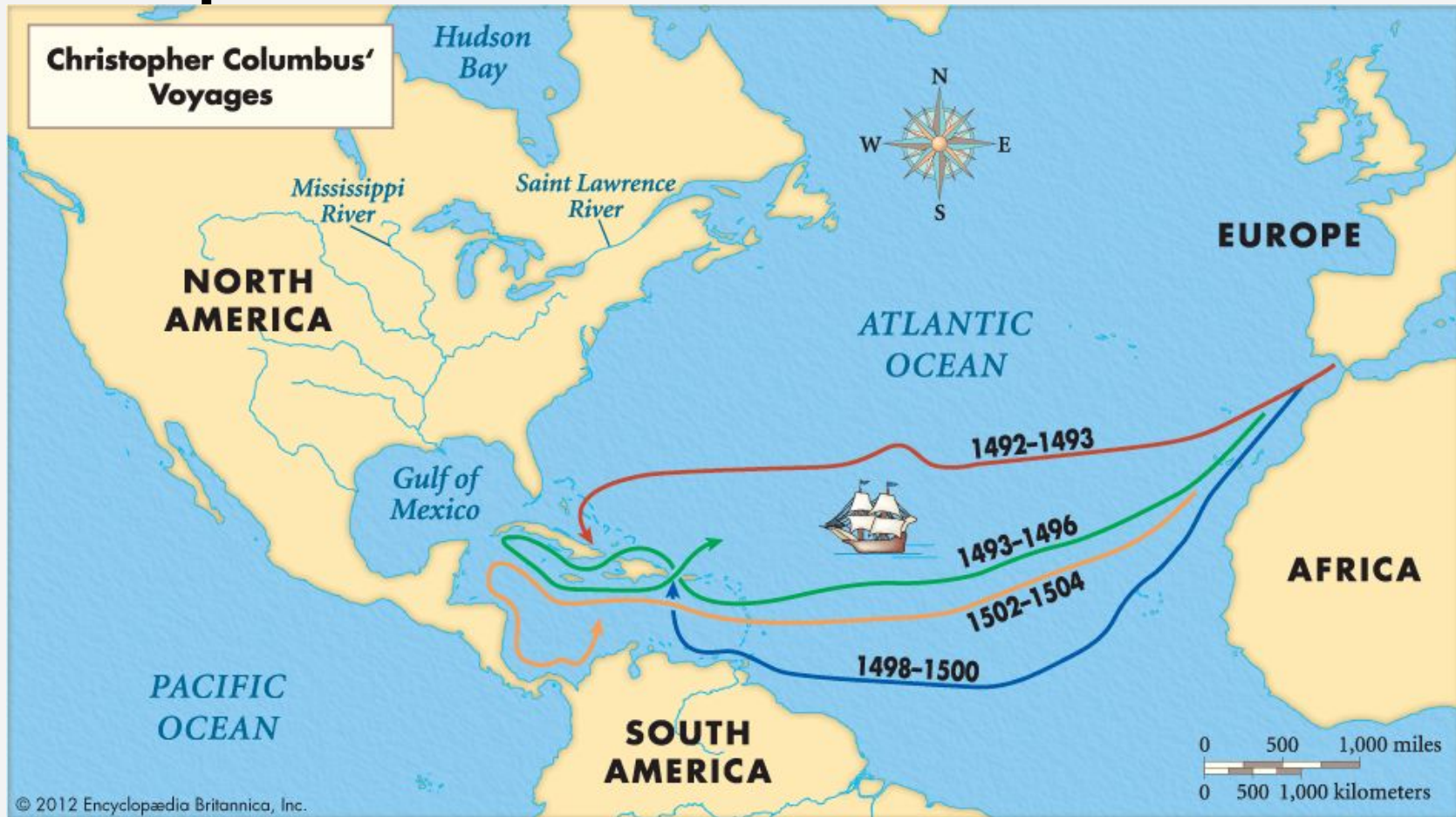

A major consequence of Columbus's voyages was the eventual exchange of goods between the Old World (Europe) and the New World (the Americas). Listed below are some of the goods that were shared in this "Columbian Exchange" between the continents.
